Bridgewater State University Board of Trustees Meeting February 22, 2022 Virtual Zoom Meeting

Under the order suspending certain provisions of the open meeting law of the Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 30A, as declared on March 12, 2020 by Governor Baker, having been complied with, and a quorum of the Board virtually present, the Board of Trustees held a zoom meeting on February 22, 2022 with Chairman Durgin presiding.

	Chairman Durgin called the meeting to order to order at 5:10pm. He asked the Trustees if it would be acceptable to dispense with a roll call after each action item as long as the vote is unanimous.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT	Chairman Durgin greeted everyone and welcomed Renee Bernier, Coordinator of Academic Coaching and Research Services, as the new incoming APA Chapter President.

MSCA/APA Remarks

MSCA Chapter President Seceleanu and APA Chapter President Bernier presented remarks for the key priorities and main challenges that faculty, librarians and staff are facing. There is increased workload due to the hiring freeze, retirements and resignations as well as a substantial pay cut in real dollars given the inflation rate of 7% during this past year. They are hopeful for inclusion of faculty, librarians and staff in the decision-making process to meet the challenges of under enrollment and underfunding. Shared governance will help to find solutions to these challenges. The Fair Share Amendment is a proposal on the statewide ballot in November 2022 to amend the Massachusetts Constitution, creating an additional tax of four percentage points on the portion of a person's annual income above \$1M. If the amendment passes, it could be a game changer for our students.

Trustee Kopellas noted students are anxious and are experiencing fatigue in wearing masks. Communication is a key component for students. They are excited for spring break which will help morale.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Clark welcomed Renee Bernier and Jenna Shales. The Fare Share Amendment will greatly benefit higher education. He personally supports the amendment. It's essential to get to the average of the United States when it comes to per capita funding. From an income perspective, we are near the bottom out of the 50 states. Public higher education educates twothirds of the students who go on to college.

Chairman Durgin stated the Board will offer their support of this amendment.

President Clark is pleased with the establishment of the Endowed Chair in Free Speech and Expression. Higher ed is a beacon of free speech and expression. It's important to note the very generous donation from Patricia and Bruce Bartlett which enabled this happen.

Provost Ismaili introduced Dr. Aeon Skoble who was appointed as the inaugural Bartlett Chair for Free Speech and Expression. He also thanked Ellen Oliver for her support and assistance through this process.

Dr. Skoble stated it is a profound honor for him and he is excited about the work this will entail. You cannot have a university that is afraid of the value of ideas and freedom of speech and expression. His goal is to run programming around the following themes: speakers, panel discussions, work with student groups, conferences, etc.

ACTION/INFORMATION ITEMS

EXECUTIVE

President's Updates - COVID Response

President Clark stated the COVID protocols are set to expire for the indoor mask mandate and travel. They are mindful of movement in the state and the country in easing protocols as well as the higher transmission rate in this area. After spring break, they will consider easing some protocols and will continue with testing and offering free test kits. Out-of-state travel will now be allowed. After spring break, it is expected there will be some indoor masking policies that will continue.

ACADEMIC AND STUDENT AFFAIRS

<u>Spring Residence Hall Occupancy Report</u> The spring residence hall occupancy report was provided for information. Housing is at 80.9% of design capacity for the spring. (Attachment)

Spring Enrollment and Admissions Report

Spring new transfer enrollment is up slightly; preliminary total enrollment for Spring 2022 is currently down 793 students from Spring 2021. The residence hall occupancy is 2,599 which is above 78% of the budgeted goal. The overall enrollment is 9,321 (increase of 61 students). Undergraduate stands at 7,754 with graduate students at 1,567.

Financial Aid Update

Monies have been distributed from the CARES Act funds. There was a record number of applications for aid which Financial Aid handled and will be distributed by the end of the semester. The ending of these funds are being considered as it will have an impact on our students. However, students are being active in pursuing ways to support their education.

<u>Approval of Childhood Studies, B.A. – Full Proposal</u> Provost Ismaili stated the proposal builds on a minor that has been in place for a number of years. The program will build knowledge and skills for our students and they can potentially move on to fields where licensure is available. It is anticipated that it will be offered to students this coming fall.

FINANCE AND OPERATIONS

FY2022/Q2 Trust Funds Report

Vice President Shropshire noted the occupancy was better than expected which is good news. They had to take \$4M for a one-time financing adjustment to assist with the decline in occupancy.

<u>FY2022/Q2 Budget Report</u> Vice President Shropshire noted the Q2 budget is going well. The

FY2023 Budget

Vice President Shropshire stated the Governor's budget has been submitted, division and trust fund budgets are being prepared, work has begun towards a final expense estimate and they have submitted refinancing to the Building Authority. The divisions have been asked to submit budget scenarios with a 2, 5 or 10 % reduction.

ALUMNI AND DEVELOPMENT

<u>FY2022\Q2</u> Alumni and Development Dashboard Report Committee Chair Turchon stated the second quarter was very strong. The endowment is over \$62M and total net assets are close to \$72M. Annual Giving Day will be held on April 13 and 14. Total commitments are \$4.8M; total donations are \$3.8M and there was a \$2.6M increase over this time from last year. As of February 15, over \$4M in donations have been received.
